Program Notes



As the name of our program suggests, all of the choral selections this evening are set to texts written by the famous renewer of the church, Martin Luther (1483– 1548). He was

not only a theologian and a reformer but also a musician and a composer. His own hymn texts and compositions (he composed about thirty chorales) have inspired composers for generations, and their works are now inescapably connected to our rich Lutheran heritage.

His philosophy on music in liturgy informs the Lutheran community even today, as he gave community singing a renewed role. His influence played a significant part in the development of music in German speaking countries.

Two of the composers on this evening's program are very well known; Johann Sebastian Bach and Felix Mendelssohn. Bach (1685-1750) of course used Lutheran themes in his cantatas and oratorios, but the connection between these two giants of history goes much deeper. Bach's connection and admiration of Luther stems from his early childhood, when he spent three years at the very same Latin school that Luther had attended two centuries earlier. He was known to own several of Luther's theological volumes

and a copy of the Luther Bible.

Felix Mendelssohn (1809–1847) was also an admirer of Luther and paid great attention to several of his hymns, including *Aus tiefer Not schrei' ich zu dir* (performed this evening) and *Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott*, which is featured prominently in the Reformation Symphony composed in 1830 to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the Augsburg Confession.

The final composer of the evening is Johnn Walter (1496–1570), who was a composer and poet during the Reformation period. His career as a musician began at the age of 21 in the chapel of Frederick the Wise, where he served as a composer and bass cantor. A pioneer of Lutheran church music, Walter edited the first Protestant hymnal for choir in Wittenberg in 1524, with a foreword by Martin Luther himself.

In 1525, Luther enlisted the help of Walter to prepare music for his German Mass. Walter said of Luther "... one sees, hears, and understands at once how the Holy Spirit has been active not only in the authors who composed the Latin hymns and set them to music, but in Herr Luther himself, who now has invented most of the poetry and melody of the German chants."



SCOTT FIKSE is a sought-after performer, composer, and director with expertise in multiple genres. Following studies in musical arts at Pacific Lutheran University, Scott served as music director for a variety of Seattle area theater companies, choral ensembles, and churches. He has participated in conducting and vocal masterclasses through University of Washington, University of Oregon, and the Barbershop Harmony Society and competed within BHS at the national and international levels. Today, in addition to directing the music program at Lutheran Church of Honolulu, Scott serves as music

director for the Honolulu Chorale, and as co-artistic director of Early Music Hawai'i.



MARTINA BINGHAM is a soprano and lecturer in voice at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. She has recent and upcoming engagements with Hawai'i Opera Theatre, the Maui Chamber Orchestra, the Alliance Française, and recital and featured solo work at the University of Hawai'i. She holds a DMA in voice pedagogy from Shenandoah University, an MM in voice pedagogy and performance from Westminster Choir College, and a BA in voice with a musical theatre emphasis from the University Hawai'i at Mānoa. Martina is currently the President of the Hawai'i Chapter of the Natioanl Association of Teachers of Singng (NATS).



SARAH LAMBERT CONNELLY is a professionally trained pianist, opera singer, and yoga instructor. Her parents enrolled her in piano lessons at the age of two after she perched herself on the bench beside the organist at church. After receiving a Master's Degree in Vocal Performance from the prestigious Eastman School of Music, she lived in New York City for nine years pursuing an operatic career. Along the way, she was exposed to yoga, and thus began a new passion. In 2009, she completed her 200-hour yoga teacher training through YogaWorks. Shortly thereafter, she met her husband in yoga class and wound up in Hawai'i through his military career. She is a Resident Artist in the Mae Z. Orvis Studio Program at Hawai'i Opera Theatre, and recently

opened their season singing Julia Child in 'Bon Appetit.'



TOMÁS RAMOS is from Austin, TX, and Lebanon, PA, and has lived in Honolulu for 2 years. He is an Orvis Choral Scholar at the Cathedral of St. Andrew, sings with Early Music Hawai'i, and is a clarinetist in the U.S. Navy, Pacific Fleet Band. Tomás holds a BM in Music Education and an MM in Classical Instrumental Performance, both from the Frost School of Music at the University of Miami, where he was also the head teaching assistant of athletic bands and a cantor at the Church of St. Augustin. He loves body surfing, will gladly challenge anyone to a few rounds of Mario Kart, and currently misses playing ping pong during breaks at work.



MAIKA'I NASH returned home to Hawai'i in 2017 after living and working abroad, primarily in Montréal and Toronto. He studied at McGill University in Montréal, at the Schubert Institute of Lieder in Vienna, the Centre for Operatic Studies in Sulmona, Italy, and privately in Paris. While abroad, he worked for a number of Canadian opera companies, McGill University, the University of Toronto, Western University, the Glenn Gould School, and the Royal Conservatory of Music. Always a voracious adventurer, he also spent 2 years in Bogotá, Colombia, working as a vocal coach, répétiteur, and pianist throughout the Colombian capital, and in the

other major cities as well. Now firmly reestablished in Honolulu, Maika'i has launched the new performing arts, non-profit group, Hl Arts Lab, a company creating experiential moments in music across multiple art forms.


