Simple Pleasures

Judging from conversations with several LCH families, July is vacation time! Some of our members are traveling off island to exotic locations like China or Great Britain. Others are heading to the Mainland to visit family or relax with friends. Some of us, however, are evoking the newly coined practice of "staycation." Yep, that means taking your vacation without actually going anywhere. While not as romantic, exciting, or life-changing as an exotic vacation abroad, there is something pretty cool and biblical about a "staycation."

Have you ever noticed that the Bible doesn't seem to say a lot about vacations? I wonder where Joshua went after a hard fought battle to rest and recuperate. Did Samuel take a week on the beach during the tourist season? Did Isaiah take in the camel races after a hard



year of prophesy? Did Jonah go fishing? The Bible doesn't seem to say much at all about vacations. It is likely that for most of the population, the idea of time away from the daily tasks of raising a family, providing food, and surviving was unknown. But we do know that our biblical heroes did understand the value of time out for rejuvenation.

King David balanced his warrior vocation with music and poetry. Lavish meals and gatherings for weddings were times for the community to gather to relax and share laughter, food, wine, and dance. Jesus was known to "go off to a lonely place alone" where he took time for prayer, meditation, and respite. We should also take time away from our daily work for ourselves, our families, and our communities. A recent poll quoted on CNN (June 10, 2009) showed that workers who have managed to keep their jobs are showing high levels of stress as they take on the work left by layoffs and early retirements. Now more than ever, we need to pay attention to our physical, spiritual, and mental health. By taking time to rest and rejuvenate, we strengthen ourselves and our relationships for the future. How can those of us who can afford neither the time nor the money for a traditional vacation find a little rest?

Start by making "breathing moments" in your day. A friend of mine uses his time between phone calls and meetings to take "mini vacations." He reads scripture, meditates, or takes a walk around his building to break up the day. The key is that he is intentional about "harvesting time" for himself. For something a little more extended, grab the family and spend a Saturday at the beach. Even better, if you have a day of vacation to burn, take yourself and/or the kids to the beach on Monday! Pack lunch and a book and head on out. I know a lot of folks don't like Waikiki, but if you are looking for a cheap and relaxing afternoon or evening, it is hard to beat. The key is low stress. Park at the Ala Wai Boat Harbor for 25¢ an hour (not a misprint), walk up the beach, and enjoy several venues of (free) music at the Hilton. Watch the sunset (free) from the beach in front of the Outrigger Reef Hotel while listening to live music at the Shorebird. Walk up to Kuhio Beach and the hula mound near the Duke Kahanamoku statue for a free hula show between 6:30 and 7:30 every day except Monday. I don't mean to sound like a tourist guide, but we really do sometimes forget that we already live in a vacation destination—a perfect place for a staycation.

The point is that we do—despite all the pressure from our bosses, boards, and family—need to take time to let our bodies and our minds rest, recover, and rejuvenate. We need to take Sabbath seriously and engage in meaningful worship and fellowship with our church 'ohana. We need to take moments or even days to pay attention to God, our families, our bodies, and our hearts so that we can joyfully return to our vocations invigorated (or at least a little less grumpy). So, go fishing with Jonah, play music with David, or pray with Jesus, but take time to take care of God's precious gift—yourself.

What's New on the LCH Website? Bill Potter, webmaster

As you will have read earlier in this *HeartBeat*, we have added a number of pages to the LCH website that will help each of us identify our spiritual gifts and put them to work in God's service at LCH.

You can get to the introductory page with this URL: <www.LCHwelcome.org/gifts>, and from there you can study the scriptural background, take the interactive Spiritual Gifts Inventory, and then explore your own individual gifts.



When you get to the "Exploration of Use" page, just click on the icon of one of your gifts and the explanatory material appears in the middle of the array. The explanation includes a listing of ministries at LCH where you can put that particular gift to use.

As you explore your gifts, when you see a ministry at LCH that appeals to you, just click on the link at the end of the explanation, and you can send form mail to one of our Spiritual Gifts team volunteering to "try out" that ministry. Your name and contact information will be forwarded to the coordinator of that ministry, and you'll be contracted to get started. Part of the theory behind spiritual gifts is that we need to validate the gifts we identify by putting them to use, so we should all look on this as a chance to try out the gift and not a lifetime commitment.

We hope you will give the spiritual gifts "mini website" a try.

On a different matter, you may remember that a year or so ago we introduced the LCH Table Talk message boards on the LCH website. The message boards allow members and friends to exchange ideas from their computers and give our groups a secure site to discuss their issues. Since not many of us have gotten involved, we are going to reintroduce LCH Table Talk during the Christian Education hour following worship on Sunday, July 19, when the Stages of Spiritual Development series is on break. Come to the Boardroom for a demonstration of the capabilities of the message boards and to get help with the registration process. Join us on July 19, around 10:30.

Youth Learn about God's 'Aina

Members of the LCH youth group joined OYEA (Oahu Youth Education and Activities) for a fun an informative day at Calvary by the Sea Lutheran Church with Malama Maunalua Bay, an organization offering education and services to protect and revitalize the bay fronting Hawaii Kai and Aina Haina.

Youth participants were treated to hands-on research projects like measuring oxygen levels in the bay, checking for phosphates, and identifying invasive species of seaweed. By wading along the tidal wall to a nearby stream, the youth learned how important freshwater tidal areas are to certain species of sea life. When America was still a colony from 1732 to 1758, Benjamin Franklin authored and published an annual Poor Richard's Almanack that was full of wit and wisdom, proverbs and maxims on industry, frugality, thrift, courtesy, and health. The Almanack became a best-seller, and was distributed free by clergy to poor parishioners. Here is some of Poor Richard's maxims:

- "Many have quarreled about religion who never practiced it."
- "None preaches better than the ant, and she says nothing."
- "Good sense and learning may esteem obtain, humor and wit a laugh, if rightly taken; fair virtue admiration may impart; but tis good-nature only wins the heart. It molds the body to an easy grace, and brightens every feature of the face; it smooths the unpolished tongue with eloquence, and adds persuasion to the finest sense."
- "Great beauty, great strength, and great riches are really and truly of no great use; a right heart exceeds all."
- "Virtue and happiness are mother and daughter."
- "Don't judge of men's wealth or piety by their Sunday appearances."
- "Love, and be loved."
- "Those who are feared are hated."
- "Nothing brings more pain than too much pleasure; nothing more bondage than too much liberty."
- "Who has deceived thee as often as thyself?"


